What is Community Emergency Planning?

Community emergency planning increases resilience by harnessing local resources and expertise to help the community help themselves during an emergency.

Parish and Town Councils do not have any statutory duty to:

- create a Community Emergency Plan (CEP)
- act as a first responder to residents in an emergency

The creation of a simple plan will increase understanding of risk, and help reduce the impacts on communities, infrastructure, essential services and the environment.



Community Emergency Plans (CEPs)

- Outlines risks a community might face e.g. forest fire, flood, infectious disease, utility failure
- Outlines first steps a community can take to enable a quick, efficient response
- Summarises knowledge, skills and resources within a community who might be able to help reduce long and short term impacts
- Allows for a streamlined response that complements the work of Category 1 & 2 responders who have statutory duties

What Community Emergency Plans DO NOT do

- Remove the duties of the emergency services, local authorities, and other organisations with statutory responsibilities
- Pass responsibilities over to the Parish Council or community
- Encourage or ask individuals to put themselves or others at risk
